- Supplementing conventional teaching process of chalk and board with Audio-visual aids.

 - Regular conduction of Class test, sessional Exams.

The question papers are prepared by internal faculty as well as external experts, conduction of examination, invigilation work etc. is done by the School. The Schools also calls the faculty members from other Universities also.
