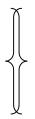

PROGRAMME STRUCTURE AND COURSE DETAILS INTRODUCTION

The Master of social work is an Interdisciplinary programme. The master degree provides professional education in social work equip the learners to confidently engage in the practices of Individual work, group work, community work, research, policy formulation and analysis, advocacy and social & political interventions. Social work knowledge is an evidence- based knowledge derived from Research, Practice and Evaluation of different human problems. Programme is structured in such a way that learners utilize theories of social work for intervenes the societal problems of development, protection, prevention and treatment.

The one third of the academic programme is practical based which have field supervised activities by faculty and/or stakeholders in Government and Non- Governmental Organization serving for human needs.

There are a number of career opportunities for the graduates in the areas like: Rural and Urban Community Development, Hospital Social Work, Psychiatric Social Work, Industrial Counseling, Family Counseling, Child Welfare, Administration of NGOs, Corporate Social Responsibility, Human Rights, Environment and Disaster Management, Project Preparation & Evaluation and Field level Research Projects.

OBJECTIVE OF THE PROGRAMME

- To equip learners to develop knowledge, skill, professional Ethics & Values and Attitude for social work Intervention to Serve Humanity.
- To enrich students with knowledge and professional approach to understand Human needs and act as an effective social change agent.
- To develop learner as a trained professional to challenge social problems in changing scenario of world due to Liberalization, privatization and Globalization (LPG).
- To strengthen students with skill of Problem solving, resource utilization & service linkages to address peoples various developmental, psycho-social, empowerment, social justice & Human right issues.
- To develop critical understanding for integration of theory and practice.
- To develop in depth knowledge & skills in learners for qualitative and quantitative Research methods.
- To develop Interdisciplinary approach in learners to contribute knowledge and experiences to enrich knowledge.

EXPECTED OUTCOME

On completion of this course students are expected to:

- 1. Learner will have sound knowledge of professional social work.
- 2. Learner will be able to deal with human needs with professional approach.
- 3. Learner will get sufficient knowledge to work as paramedical staff.
- 4. Learner will acquire experience and knowledge in research and contribute to social work.
- 5. Learner will have positive approach toward life and be able to undertake any responsibilities with focused on future career goals.

NATURE AND DURATION OF THE PROGRAMME

The Master of Social work (M.S.W.) programme shall be regular, full time. The duration of the programme shall be four semesters for a period of two academic years. Each academic year shall be divided into two semesters.

ELIGIBILITY FOR THE PROGRAMME

Candidates who have passed 10+2+3 or equivalent examination from any discipline and must have obtained minimum aggregate 50 per cent marks (for reserved categories minimum 45 per cent marks) are eligible for admission to the programme. However, the minimum cut off score shall be decided by the admission committee. Reservation of seats for various categories shall be as per the Maharashtra State Government rules and regulations.

Distribution of the seat: Total Intake capacity of college shall be 60 seats. Seat reservation shall be as follows

- 1) 50% of total Intake seat shall be reserved for B.S.W. students.
- 2) 70% seats for shall be admitted form SRTM University.
- 3) 30% students shall be given admission from other University.

MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION

Medium of instruction shall be English.

STRUCTURE OF THE PROGRAMME

The programme shall be having the theory classes, field work practicum and Dissertation work. The semester pattern for the Master of Social Work to be revised from the academic year 2020-2021.

PROGRAMME DESCRIPTION

This Master Degree Course shall be of 106 credits which are spread over four semesters in two years including four theory papers of 100 marks each (04 credits) in each semester. For Each theory paper, there shall be Continuous Assessment (C.A.) for 50 marks and End Semester Examination (E.S.E.) for 50 marks.

There will field work practicum in each semester of 225 marks (09 credits). The field work practicum shall consist of Field Work Orientation, Concurrent Field Work, Individual Conference, Group Conference, Rural Camp; Study Tour & Orientation visits to Non Governmental Organization will be organized as part of the course.

Each student is required to complete supervised Dissertation (with viva - voce) as part of this course in the 3th and 4th semester of the programme.
